NOTORIOUSLY SLOW START DITCHES LANE COVE'S PENNANT OPENER

Lane Cove got off to a horror start in their first game of the new season against Warrawee at Warrawee. After 21 ends Lane Cove trailed by 12 shots and marginally improved after 42 ends to trail 30-38. Our intensity, except for one team, then dropped off and after 57 ends trailed by 19 shots and it was time to regroup for next week's round.

Remarkably, **Rohan Marshall** (skip), **Kevin Mulhall** (3rd), **Robert Patterson** (2nd) and **Peter Zucconi** only scored a single point in the first 11 ends, however, fortuitously held their opponents to 11 points. Then, they gathered their "better bowling selves" and crushed the opposition outpointing them by 14 shots to 3 shots to win an exciting match 15-14.

Rex Johnston, **Vic Solway**, **Chris Sinclair** and **Andrew Gordon** played some excellent bowls for the first 11 ends to lead Warrawee 11-10. Unfortunately, from that point the wheels fell off and they were outpointed over the last 10 ends by 7 shots, winning 3 of those ends, to lose the match 20-14.

John Lloyd, Robert Campbell, Stuart Smith and Mark Burrough scored 6 singles in the first 11 ends to trail Warrawee by 3 shots (6-9). It was then Warrawee's turn to up-tempo winning 8 of the last 10 ends to triumph 22-13.

To Lane Cove's credit all teams kept their opposition to low numbers on ends lost however, only won 24 of 63 ends played.

AUSSIE DESTINATIONS – Murringo, NSW

Historic village on the South West Slopes of New South Wales.



Murringo's appearance is little changed since its heyday, being described as a small but perfectly formed village. It is the oldest village in the region. Buildings such as its former inns, former convent and former police station remain. Its school building is still in use.

Today Murringo is so small that a visitor could pass through without stopping. It is a remnant of a bygone era with two handsome churches which are a reminder of the deeply religious nature of rural Australia in the nineteenth century.

Location

Murringo is 354 km south-west of Sydney via Goulburn and Yass and 370 km via Bathurst and Cowra.

Population: 365 (2016 census)

Origin of Name

Since the town was laid out by surveyors in 1849 it has been variously known as Meringo, Marringa, Muringo, Murringo, Maringo, Maringa and Marengo. It has been suggested that the origin of the name was a property in the area called Marengo, probably after the famous Napoleonic Battle of Marengo. In 1926 the local post office changed its name and the village became Murringo.

Christ Church Anglican Church



Although it is now a small church beside the main road, back in 1865 Christ Church Anglican Church was in the minds of the local Anglican community. In order to build the church Reverend Soares, the local clergyman, held a tea meeting and raised the staggering sum of £200. That is the equivalent of more than £1 for every town resident. Reverend

Soares designed the church. The foundation stone was laid on 28 March 1866 and the church was consecrated on 7 December 1866. Services now only occur on the second Sunday of each month at 8.00am.

Sacred Heart Roman Catholic Church

Not to be outdone the local Catholic community decided to match the Anglican church and so in 1871 a collection was taken up at Michael O'Connor's hotel. Tea for Anglicans? The local pub for the Catholics? Such was the fund-raising success that in 1874 the foundation stone for the Sacred Heart Catholic Church was laid. Some years later a convent school was attached to the church.



Young

No comprehensive understanding of the goldrush days in New South Wales is complete without a visit to the nearby township of Lambing Flat, now known as Young (the cherry capital).

History

Murringo is important because it is a genuinely historic village where very little has changed over the past century.

- * The Murringo area was first settled in 1827. It was one of the first settlements beyond the Blue Mountains.
- * The Marengo Station, which was established around 1833, had 21 people working for it by 1840. A survey in that year showed that 43 people were living on three properties. In 1849 a government survey planned a town around Marengo Station. The plans included a cemetery, a market place and a public park but this came to nothing when, in 1860, gold was discovered at Young (known at the time as Lambing Flat) and the population moved. In 1861 there were 128 residents in Murringo. By in 1871 there were only 119.
- *In the 1860s, bushrangers used small towns like Murringo as suitable places to hideout from the troopers who scoured the area trying to stop them. Equally there were gold prospectors - wild men dreaming of making their fortunes - wandering through the area trying to find the next place where nuggets would be easily found. A newspaper article at the time described Murringo as 'a public thoroughfare and rendezvous for horse stealers and bushrangers, being in the very heart of the lawless district'.
- * In 1879 a blacksmith's shop was opened in the town and the local police station was built the following year




