BEER PRICES TO INCREASE




The price of beer is set to rise yet again, with the tax raised by the ATO.

From February 1, the cost of draught, as well as packaged beer, will increase significantly, with the excise increasing by 3.7 per cent which comes on top of a 4 per cent increase in August 2022.

The tax on beer is tied to inflation, and rises every six months.

The current taxes mean Australians pay more in beer tax than every other nation, save for Japan, Finland and Norway.

NEW TRIDENT SIMS PRIMED FOR BPL DEBUT

Just one player will be making their debut at next month's **BPL17** and the honour has been bestowed upon Tasmanian **Michael Sims** who will don the yellow, green and red for the Tridents in Moama come February 20.

The 26-year-old replaces one of the franchise's foundation players in **Mark Nitz** to team up with two-time BPL All Star **Rebecca Van Asch** and **Taelyn Male** on the Murray.

It will mark a new challenge in Sims' career, as playing under lights in amidst a television production is not something a bowler goes through most times that they step onto the green.

"I'd say it's a bit daunting in some ways because you hear people talking about the bowlers they see on TV and now I'm going to be one of those," Sims said.

"Now they could be talking about me which makes it daunting but I've played a fair few games on a live stream so there's a small element that I've experienced already.

"But having the eyes of the wider bowls community on me will be a new experience and hopefully it doesn't play too many tricks on me on the green, but time will tell."

The Trevallyn Bowling Club exponent relishes any opportunity to represent his state on the grand scale and the BPL has become one of the pinnacle events to do so since the Tridents made their debut almost a year ago on the Murray.

“It’s hard to put into words I guess, I always love pulling on the Tassie colours whenever I get the opportunity to do so,” he said.

“It’s something that many aspire to do, and to be able to do it now at the BPL is quite exciting.

“I’m very much looking forward to it and nervous at the same time but hopefully the nerves disappear once I pull the boots on for the first game.”

Sims’ family is just as excited for him to front up in the marquee tournament, with his father already booking his ticket to witness his son’s exploits, while the rest of his excited relatives and friends will take in the action from their televisions.

“Dad found out when it was all announced publicly and it was only a matter of moments before he had booked flights and accommodation so he’s going to be on his way up to watch it in person,” he said.

“He’s pretty excited and so is mum, she’s over the moon but she’ll take comfort at home on the couch and watch me from there instead.”

BPL17 is scheduled for February 20-24, 2023, with 24 hours of live broadcast on Fox Sports, Kayo and Sky Sports NZ across Tuesday to Friday evenings from 4pm-10pm AEDT, 3pm-9pm AEST.

DESTINATIONS – Falls Creek, VIC



Victoria's most exclusive ski resort

Falls Creek is located 30 km south of Mount Beauty, on a scenic and very winding road, and is 1580 m above sea-level at the edge of the Bogong High Plains. It overlooks the Kiewa Valley. The highest elevation in the area is 1,842 metres and, for skiers, the highest lift point is at an elevation of 1780 metres. There are 23 lifts operating from 8.30 a.m. to 4.30 p.m. daily with an uphill capacity of 20,850 per hour. There are over 92 runs for alpine skiing with 17% of the slopes being for beginners, 60% for intermediate and 23% for advanced skiers. The vertical drop is 267 metres and there are 145 ha of groomed skiing area. Some of the country's best cross-country skiing is available with 21 trails and a groomed trail network of 65 km. Some trails lead around Rocky Valley Reservoir (the Rocky Valley Dam trail is 21 km) and to old stockmen's huts which are scattered across the alpine landscape. They are remnants of the days when cattle were driven on to the high plains in the summertime. There are a total of 4,500 beds in lodges and other accommodation at Falls Creek.

Because it is such a large centre it has extensive facilities including ski and snowboard hire, a ski school, discos, nightclubs, restaurants, supermarkets, cafes, pubs, ski and gear-hire shops and a well-integrated internal transport service that will take you from the carpark to the lodges.

The ski season opens on the King's Birthday weekend in June and lasts, on average, for 128 days. The resort is open all year round and attracts visitors in summer when the air is crisp and the wildflowers and snow gums are in bloom. Early January is an ideal time for walking and there are many tracks to explore. Mountain biking, canoeing, sailing, fishing, horse riding, abseiling, archery, camping, environmental studies, orienteering, a ropes course, rafting, fishing, cable gliding, yoga and massage are offered in the summer months.

Location

Falls Creek, which is 30 km south of Mount Beauty on a very windy road, is 391 km north-east of Melbourne via the Hume Highway and the Great Alpine Road.

Origin of Name

Falls Creek was, rather unimaginatively, named after some waterfalls further down the road.

Falls Creek Museum

Located on Slalom Street in the Panabode Building, this is a fascinating collection which deals with the unique alpine history of the area since the 1940s with videos, photographs and documents.

Walks from Falls Creek Resort

The Australian Alps Walking Track (a huge 655 km track) from Walhalla to Tharwa in the ACT crosses the Bogong High Plains Road about 10 km south of Falls Creek. There are many shorter walks in the area which start from around the village. The destinations include Mt Nelse (9 km return); Wallace's Hut (1.5 km return); Rocky Valley Lake (2 km); Cope Hut (1 km return), the Wallace/Cope Hut circuit walk - includes the oldest hut in the area which dates from 1889 (6 km return); the Wallace Hut/Langfords Gap Circuit (8 km return); a walk to the top of Mount Cope which is 1837 m (1.5 hours return); Falls Creek Falls (14 km); Ruined Castle (6 km return); Fitzgerald and Kelly Huts (11 km return); Tawonga Huts, Howmans Gap and Roper's Lookout (5 km return) which offers excellent views over the village.

Falls to Hotham Alpine Crossing

For those eager to enjoy the fresh air this is a 37 km, three-day hike connecting Falls Creek to Hotham. The Falls Creek website offers an excellent description of the experience: "Walk over high alpine ridgelines, down through magical riverside valleys to wetlands brimming with life. Sleep out under blinking stars and unwind amid the tranquil beauty of this ancient country. Wander across high plains, alive with the brilliant colour of summertime wildflowers, and keep an eye out for shy native wildlife watching you pass. Summer is the most popular season to walk the Falls to Hotham Alpine Crossing, with wildflowers in full bloom and the cool alpine air a welcome break from the heat below."

Rocky Valley Lookout and Lake

Located 2 km south of Falls Creek via the Bogong High Plains Road, the Rocky Valley Lookout offers excellent views over the Rocky Valley Lake, a 250-ha storage. It is also possible to rent sailboats, paddle boats, kayaks and paddle boards and enjoy sailing and boating on the lake.

Mountain Biking

There is a Falls Creek Mountain Bike Park which has over 40 km of machine-built single track tracks which wind through snow gums and alpine pastures. It is suitable for all abilities and, for the more experienced, there is a 10 km descent from the Summit to the Ticketbox.

History

- By the 1850s local farmers were using the alpine pastures for summer grazing of cattle.
- In the 1930s a road was built to gain access to Falls Creek.
- Falls Creek village came into existence on State-Electricity-Commission Land in 1940.
- The first ski lodge was built by the Electricity workers in 1948.
- The first ski lift was built in 1951.
- A chairlift was constructed, the first in Australia, in 1957.
- In 2005 the Victorian Government withdrew summer grazing leases from the area.
- The Falls Creek Post Office was opened in 1958.

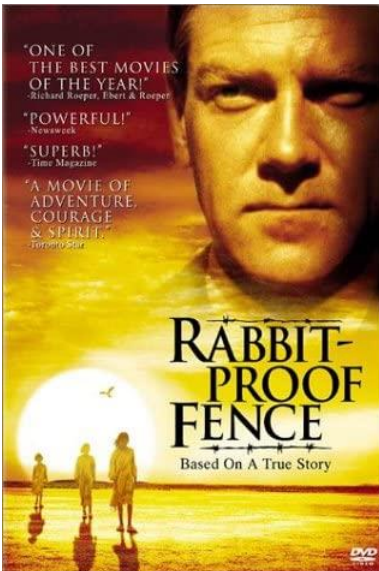
