REGIONAL BOWLS MANAGERS AND BOWLS NSW HELP CLUBS ACHIEVE GRANT WINDFALL BY LACHLAN WILLIAMS ON FEBRUARY 17, 2023

Communities continue to reap the benefits of close working relationships with Bowls Australia's Regional Bowls Managers (RBMs), with recent grant success helping clubs across NSW.

RBMs worked closely with local clubs and Bowls NSW to ensure plenty of funds from the NSW Government's Local Sports Defibrillator Grant and Local Sports Grant found their way to bowls clubs.

More than \$170,000 was assigned to 30 clubs for various projects, including green or club renovations, purchasing of bowls and wheelchairs, and other sport-related equipment and infrastructure, while more than \$37,000 was allocated across 10 bowls clubs to purchase defibrillators.

The outcome is a positive one for all recipients, who continue to benefit from the hard work and ongoing collaboration between RBMs and Bowls NSW.

Bowls NSW CEO Tim Rowe, who commenced in December last year, has worked closely with RBMs since starting in the role.

"It is fantastic to see our new CEO Tim Rowe working hand-in-hand with the NSW RBMs to achieve some great results," Bowls NSW President Dilys Kindleysides said.

Bowls Australia has 19 Regional Bowls Managers situated across the width and breadth of the country, working in conjunction with state and territory associations and clubs.

Each RBM lives and works within their region and are intrinsically in touch with the issues surrounding each club in their area.

They are a support resource to clubs and communities in their region, helping across a vast range of areas varying from participation initiatives, event support, grants, governance and marketing, just to name a few.

Bowls Australia Development and Programs Manager Brett Hughes said the recent grant success is a great example of the kind of support RBMs can provide.

2023-24 Season Calendar Release

Bowls NSW State Match Committee have finalised a calendar of events up to the end of June 2024.

The 2023–24 Season Calendar is available to view on the Bowls NSW website in both printable pdf and online formats.

Calendar Changes

Single Gender Pennant

- Districts and Zones will have from 1 July to mid–April, each season to complete Single Gender (Men & Women) Pennant competitions, with State Finals to be conducted in mid to late May each season.
- Single Gender (Men & Women) Pennant competitions may be played as midweek or weekend competitions. State Finals will be held midweek.
- It is recommended that Single Gender (Men & Women) Pennant competitions be conducted over a maximum of six (6) rounds.

Open Gender Pennant

- Districts and Zones will have from mid–January to mid–May each season to complete State Open Pennant competitions, with State Finals scheduled for the last weekend in June each season.
- State Open Pennant competitions MUST be played of a weekend (this may include Friday evenings).
- It is recommended that State Open Pennant competitions be conducted over a maximum of ten (10) rounds.
- The Bowls NSW ‘Platinum Pennant’ competition has been confirmed for the 2023–24 season, and is scheduled to take place from April to May 2024. Further information on this event will be provided shortly.

Club, District and Zone Championships

- Districts and Zones will have from 1 July to mid-January each season to complete their State Singles, Pairs, Triples and Fours Championships in State, Senior and Open Reserve levels, with the Bowls NSW State Championships to be conducted over the first two weeks in March.
- Clubs will have from 1 July to mid-March each season to complete their Major Singles and Pairs Championships, with State Champion of Champions finals scheduled for late April to early May each season.

State Junior Events

- After consultation with the State Junior Committee and host venue Club Dubbo, the 2022–23 Junior Inter-Zone 7–A–Side will be played from 19–20 August 2023. The purpose of the date change is to have the event used as the final selection trial for the NSW Under 18 State Side to contest the Nationals.
- The Brett Duprez Junior Series originally scheduled for 5 March 2023 will not go ahead on this date. Bowls NSW is looking at potential dates for conducting this event in the future.
- The annual NSW v QLD Junior Test Series will take place in New South Wales from 3 – 5 July 2023. The series will be held in New South Wales, at a venue to be confirmed.

The foundation of the new Season Calendar proposes that:

- The first six months of a season (July to December) is for Districts and Zones to complete all disciplines of their State Championships and for Bowls NSW to conduct its participation events (Over 40s Pairs, Rookies, Mixed Pairs, etc)
- The second six months of a season (January to June) is for Districts and Zones to conduct Pennant competitions and for

Bowls NSW to conduct all its State Championship Finals and State Pennant Finals.

- Please note: The program does allow for Districts and Zones to play Single Gender (Men & Women) Pennant competitions in the first six months (July to December) if they so choose to, however, State Open Pennant events cannot be commenced until mid-January each season.

This approach intends to allow greater flexibility for competition delivery, which was highlighted as a key priority in the feedback we received from our membership.

Conditions of Play

The State Match Committee has received extensive feedback regarding the 2023–24 Conditions of Play (CoP) and has commenced drafting the 2023–24 CoP documents. The CoP will be put forward for feedback from the Districts and Zones in due course.

LCBC NRL FOOTY TIPPING 2023 TERMS AND CONDITIONS

These terms and conditions form the in-house rules of the NRL tipping comp conducted for 2023

1. Entry. Entry Fee is \$50 per person. Two persons may enter as a “joint entry” for the cost of \$25 per person as a combined entry.
2. The entry fee must be paid in full prior to the completion of the first round (commencing Thursday 2nd March 2023) to the Bar Staff. Please ensure that the bar staff register your payment.
3. The Rules:
 - a. All rules will be as per the standard Footytips website. Tips may only be entered online at https://www.footytips.com.au/comps/lcbc_footy_tipping_2023
All games up to and including the grand final are included in the competition. The State of Origin may be included, however, only if the State of Origin is included in the competition by Footytips.
 - b. Individual game tips are locked-in at kick-off but may be changed prior to the game commencing.
 - c. Points: 1 point is awarded for a win or draw or an abandoned game. 0 points are awarded for a loss.
 - d. Failure to submit a tip for a game will result in a zero point for that game. No "away game" will be awarded as default points.
 - e. There will be 2 bonus points awarded for a perfect round. This applies to Regular Season rounds only. The Semi-Finals, the Grand Final and State of Origin games are not included and no Bonus Points are awarded in these rounds.”

4. Prize Pool.

The prize money pool will be based on the number of competition entrants. 1st Place = 60%, 2nd Place = 20%, 3rd Place = 15% and 4th Place = 5% of the total prize pool. In the event of a draw for 1st Place, a 50% (or an applicable %) split will apply to each of the places. For example, if 1st place is shared by two persons, then each would receive a 50% share of each of the 1st and 2nd places combined and so on up to 4th place.

5. Twice-weekly Draw.

There will be a twice-weekly draw of all competition entrants. At each draw, one name will be drawn, and the winner will receive an in-house voucher to the value of \$10 (no change will be given). The winner must be present at the time of the draw. In the event of the winner not being present, the prize will be forfeited. There will be no re-draws. The draws will take place each Friday 7:40pm & Sunday 4:00pm (approximately). All entrants are included in each draw.

State of Origin, Grand Final & Winners Presentation night.

OLDER AUSTRALIANS ENCOURAGED TO ROLL BACK THE CLOCK

Lane Cove Bowling and Recreation Club is taking a step towards curbing low physical activity rates among older Australians by encouraging them to "roll back the clock" through lawn bowls.

Roll Back the Clock is a Bowls Australia initiative, in partnership with Sport Australia, that aims to boost physical activity rates among Australians aged 65 and over through bowls, light exercise and education.

Presently, as little as 25-percent of Australians over-65 meet the Department of Health's physical activity guidelines of 30 minutes of activity per day.

Health-related reasons, including physical and mental health, are the main barriers for older Australians participating in sport or physical activities and bowls is seen as a low-impact, socially-inclusive activity that can be enjoyed by individuals of all ages.

Roll Back The Clock programs incorporate a two-part activity lasting 30 minutes each, targeting both the body and mind through bowls, functional training, fitness and wellness education, and socialisation.

Sessions are adapted for individuals, with benefits ranging from enabling participants to perform activities of daily life more easily, to withstanding injuries and providing a sense of accomplishment and achievement.

In addition to the physical health benefits, engaging in physical activity and group sports for older Australians provides increasingly important opportunities for socialisation, peer-support, and conversation that reduces the possibility for loneliness related physical and mental illnesses.

OZ DESTINATIONS – Berrigan, NSW

Quiet rural country town.



Berrigan is a traditional and charming small country town surrounded by rich agricultural land known for its rice production, vineyards, maize, grapefruit, potatoes, cherries, tomatoes and dairy cattle. The primary appeal of the town is the way it has been held in aspic. It is a town which still belongs in the 1950s ... a reminder of a simpler way of life.

Location

Berrigan, which is 119 m above sea level, is located 678 km south-west of Sydney via the Hume and Riverina highways and 313 km north of Melbourne via the Hume and Goulburn Valley highways.

Origin of Name

The town seems to have been named after the local Berrigan Hotel which was opened in 1888. Two years later a village of the same name was proclaimed.

Population: 1,260 (2016 census) **Elevation:** 119 m (390 ft)

Berrigan Heritage Walk

The Berrigan and District Heritage Museum has a full colour Heritage Town Walk which identifies 20 places of interest around the town and provides information about each location. It is an ideal way to learn about the history of the town while enjoying the timeless ambience. It is best to just go for a wander around town, though some highlights are the brick post office on the corner of Carter and Jerilderie Streets; in Chanter Street, the Federal Hotel with its Dutch gables; and, across the road, the arches and gables of Memorial Hall. Also of interest is the lead window at St Aidan's Anglican Church which commemorates the European pioneers in the district.

Berrigan & District Heritage Museum

Located at 60 Jerilderie Street, the Berrigan & District Heritage Museum offers a great historic introduction to the local area with its displays of fire brigade memorabilia (Berrigan established the first rural fire service in the country); material relating to the Berrigan's military history including guns, medals, uniforms and service records of Berrigan men and women who served in World War II, plus some from World War I. There are also photos and press cuttings of early farming and the coming of irrigation in 1939 via the Mulwala Canal.

Berrigan Government Nature Reserve Tank Paddock

The Berrigan Government Nature Reserve Tank Paddock is a walking trail situated on the eastern side of town which is well signposted and provides information about the indigenous plant species and the fauna in the district.

The Drop



About halfway along the road from Berrigan to Barooga (Berrigan Road) is 'The Drop', where the Berrigan Road crosses the Mulwala Canal. There is a parking area to the right just after the road crosses the canal. This is part of a large water-flow control system which allows water to divert from Mulwala Canal into Berrigan Channel. It is Australia's first

hydroelectric power station on an irrigation canal. The power station has a generating capacity of 2.5 MW of electricity.

History

- * Europeans settled in the 1870s on land subdivided from the 'Barooga' and 'Boomanooma' stations which stretched from the Murray River up to where the township is now located.
- * The Berrigan Post Office opened in 1884.
- * The township grew up around the Berrigan Hotel which opened in 1888.
- * The town was officially proclaimed in 1890.
- * In 1893 some of the citizens of Berrigan organised the Corowa Conference on Federation which led to the creation of Australia.
- * The railway reached the town in 1896.
- * The first Rural Fire Brigade was formed in Berrigan in 1901.
- * Berrigan was declared the principal town of the newly declared shire in 1906. The shire included the towns - Tocumwal, Barooga and Finley.
- * In 1909 the first meeting of a Parents and Teachers Association in New South Wales was held in the town.
- * The population of the town peaked in 1911 with over 1000 people.
- * The Mulwala Canal reached the area in 1939.
- * The population in the district increased after World War II as a result of the construction of the Berriquin Irrigation Scheme which guaranteed water certainty.
- * Mulwala Canal was completed in 1949. It brought water from Lake Mulwala to Berrigan Shire. This led to increased intensive agriculture in the district.

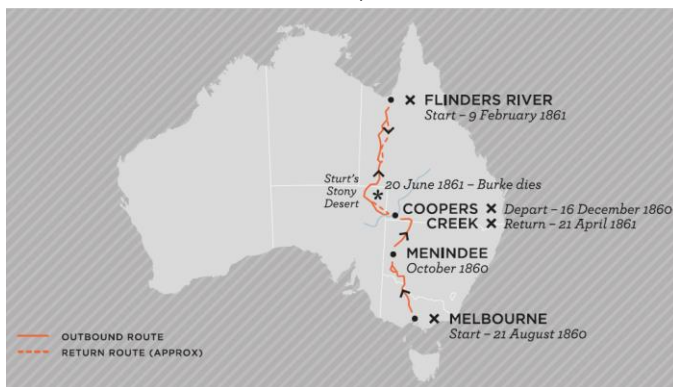


Death of Robert O’Hara Burke

The Australian pioneer Robert O'Hara Burke died of starvation on June 30th, 1861.

The leader of Australia’s most famous expedition of exploration was born in 1820 in County Galway, Ireland into a family of Protestant gentry and trained in England for the army. Of an adventurous disposition, he took a commission in the Austrian army’s cavalry for a time before joining the Irish police. In 1853 he emigrated to Australia and made his way up in the police force of Victoria. In 1860 he was given command of a government-backed expedition formed to prove or disprove the existence of the supposed Inland Sea. His second-in-command was a surveyor called William Wills.

Camels were specially imported from India for the Burke and Wills expedition, which added to the excitement when the party set out from Melbourne in August. Burke had great charm, but neither the experience nor the temperament to make a good leader. A diminished party reached the Cooper’s Creek waterholes in Queensland in November and from there Burke, Wills and two others made a dash north to the Gulf



of Carpentaria, which would give them fame as the first white men to cross the continent. They had left their stores at Cooper’s Creek in the charge of a man named William Brahé to await their return, but when the three

survivors regained Cooper’s Creek in April they found to their horror that he had given them up and left earlier that same day, leaving only a tiny quantity of provisions.

Wills wanted to follow Brahé, but Burke decided to make for a sheep station to the south, which he thought was much closer than it really was. It was a critical mistake. Shortage of water forced them back to Cooper’s Creek where, crippled with exhaustion, they were unable to fend for themselves. Although friendly aboriginals occasionally gave them food, Burke and Wills both died of starvation. John King, the sole survivor, was rescued by an expedition in September. What was left of Burke and Wills was buried with honour in Melbourne the following January.
