LANE COVE BOWLERS QUALIFY FOR FINALS PLAY-OFFS

Lane Cove Bowlers **John Lloyd** and **Scott Bonthrone** were two of twelve qualifiers for the Zone 9 Reserve Singles Championship play-offs next Sunday.

In a changed format to previous years this year's event was a round robin with 12 sections each containing 3 bowlers.

John Lloyd in Section 4 won both his games against V Meth (Harbord) 15 and K Bettman (Chatswood) 17 respectively.

Scott Bonthrone in Section 6 round 2 defeated fellow Lane Covian Deon Van Niekerk 22 in a close game and in round three had the better of S Gibson (Harbord) 20.

Deon Van Niekerk 23 lost a tight first round to S Gibson (Harbord) and to Scott Bonthrone 22:25.

Sarah Hobson in Section 7 had a first round win over G Barton (Asquith) 15 before losing to S Semler (Balgowlah) 17:25.

Kay Mulhall (Section 5) had a first round by succumbing to R Andrews (Forestville RSL) 13:25 in round 3.

Kevin Mulhall (Section 11) lost both his matches against J Gibson (Harbord Women) and S Robin (Harbord).

Overall, it was a good result for Lane Cove bowlers and, hopefully John and Scott can qualify next Sunday for the finals on 16 April 2023.

LANE COVE FIVERS ONE FROM THREE FAILS TO STOP PITTWATER

After 21 ends Lane Cove were behind the eight-ball trailing Pittwater by 17 shots (7:24) before improving slightly to trail by 15 points after 42 ends and 15 points was the final margin in Pittwater's favour.

Sarah Hobson's team of **Scott Bonthrone** (3rd), **Stuart Smith** (2nd) and **Kay Mulhall** (lead) had a strong game limiting their opposition's scoring to singles on 9 ends and only 2 ends where they managed to score 2 points. A 5 pointer on end 13 gave them the impetus to roll on for a 20:13 victory.

It was a tad harder for **Bob Patterson's** team of **Kevin Mulhall** (3rd), **Simon Kinsman** (2nd) and **Deon Van Niekerk** who found themselves trailing by 16 points (5:21) after 13 ends and it was always going to be a monumental task to claw back such a deficit at that stage.

John Lloyd (skip), **Chris Sinclair** (3rd), **Peter Zucconi** (2nd) and **Rex Johnston** may have been a little unlucky to lose their match by 3 shots – 15:18. After leading 9:7 after 13 ends they conceded 8 shots in 3 ends but quickly regained them to square things up 15 all after 19 ends only to see Pittwater win the last two ends and match.



Re: The Platinum Pennant

Introducing: The Platinum Pennant

Overview

The Platinum Pennant will be introduced as part of the 2023-24 State Open Pennant competition. The competition will start in April 2024 with the finals to take place in mid-May 2024.

Context

Bowls NSW receives a great deal of feedback regarding the Open State Pennant competition. Key themes include:

- That Bowls NSW favours the elite clubs and players with the current competition structures
- That the elite clubs, with more money to spend on players, monopolise the Grade 1 competition
- This monopoly is unfair on smaller sized clubs and regional clubs who want the opportunity to compete in the Grade 1 competition, however, can't compete against the elite clubs and players.
- Some clubs in regional areas competing in the current Grade 1 competition who qualified for State Finals felt that they were only there to 'make up the numbers'. As such, they had a considerable expense to compete with no real expectation of progressing beyond sectional play.

• There is a current trend of clubs steadily dropping down pennant Grades. Bowls NSW wants to reverse this trend.

The Purpose of the Platinum Pennant

The Platinum Pennant has been introduced in relation to the above commentary and is aimed at:

- Creating a world class competition for clubs with elite level players, where the playing field is even and all matches are competitive
- Providing a vehicle for promotion and showcasing the sport through streaming.
- Providing an opportunity for host clubs to promote their home matches and encourage spectator attendance.
- Levelling the playing field in the Grade 1 competition and encouraging other clubs across the State to enter Grade 1 pennant sides

Additional information

Scheduling

Matches in the Platinum Pennant may be scheduled on Friday evenings, Saturday morning, afternoon or evening and on Sunday Morning or afternoon. Clubs will have a greater choice over match times, and as such will be encouraged to promote their home matches to attract spectators and to attract social members and visitors within the club to watch the sport.

Promotion & Streaming

Bowls NSW will promote the competition and will live stream selected competition matches each week.

Entering a Side into the Platinum Pennant

Expressions of Interest will open shortly for clubs to enter the Platinum Pennant. Expressions of Interest are open to all affiliated bowls clubs across NSW however, final selection into the Platinum Pennant will be subject to the discretion of Bowls NSW and the State Match Committee.

Conditions of Play

Match formats for the Platinum Pennant will be the same as all other Open Gender Pennant Grades i.e. 12 players per side, three teams of four, 63 end matches. Clubs competing in the Platinum Pennant will be required to nominate a squad of at least 12 players, male or female, to make up their side. These players will not be eligible to play in Grades 1-7 during the season.

Full Conditions of Play and details of the competition, including entry fees and prize money, will be provided in due course.



OZ DESTINATIONS – Bungonia, NSW

Small town on the edge of an impressive State Recreation Area.



Bungonia is a tiny town made notable only by the presence of the oldest Roman Catholic church in Australia and the beautiful Bungonia State Recreation Area which not only has a series of sublime views down into the gorge carved by the Shoalhaven River but also has a huge limestone quarry which is a reminder of how much damage can be done to an otherwise pristine landscape by open cut mining.

Location

Bungonia, which is 580 metres above sea level, is located 185 km south-west of Sydney via the Hume Freeway.

Origin of Name

It has been claimed that Bungonia means "sandy creek which only flows when it rains" in the language of the local Gundungurra Aboriginal people.

Population: 367 Elevation: 581m Rainfall: 586mm

Bungonia's Churches

Bungonia has two important churches of which St Michael's Roman Catholic church - the oldest Roman Catholic church in Australia - is the most interesting. It was opened in 1839 and consecrated by Bishop Polding in 1847. It is hardly a handsome church being made from cement-rendered random-rubble. The town's attractive church is the Christ Church Anglican Church (1893) which stands on the opposite hill.

Bungonia State Recreation Area

The Bungonia State Recreation Area covers 3,971 ha of bushland in the Southern Tablelands and is characterised by deep limestone gorges, dry sclerophyll forests, and around 200 caves - five of which are reputedly the deepest caves on the Australian mainland. It was reserved for public recreation in 1872 and became a state recreation area in 1974. Recent research has discovered over 300 types of flora in the park and over 70 varieties of birdlife. The National Parks and Wildlife Service's 1998 Management Plan describes the recreation area as catering "for a variety of activities including caving, walking, canyoning, abseiling, rock climbing, canoeing, camping, sightseeing and scientific research. Many of these are undertaken in environmentally sensitive locations or rugged terrain."

The recreation area's main attractions include Bungonia and Jerrara Falls; Jerrara Canyon Lookout, Jerrara Lookout, Adams Lookout and the Lookdown; the Mass Cave and Grill Cave, the Green, White, Yellow and Red tracks which traverse the plateau and drop down to Bungonia Creek and Shoalhaven River.

The Lookdown

Located 1.5 km from the Bungonia National Park office and only 50 m from the car park, this viewing area offers excellent views down to the Bungonia Creek valley. The valley below the lookdown is known variously as Bungonia Gorge, Bungonia Slot Gorge or Bungonia Canyon and is a drop of nearly 300 metres in a gorge which is only 800 metres long and only 76 metres wide. It is the reputedly the deepest gorge in Australia.

Caving, Canyoning and Climbing in Bungonia National Park



The National Parks and Wildlife website points out that "There are around 200 'wild' caves in the park, many of which are open for experienced cavers to explore. For an exciting journey of waterfalls and plunge pools, Bungonia Creek and Jerrara Creek are the most popular canyoning spots. Bungonia Slot Canyon provides one of the few opportunities in Australia for climbing limestone and is as dramatic a place to scale a rock wall as its name suggests." The Odyssey Cave, which has a depth of 147.8 m is the second deepest cave on the Australian mainland.

The Limestone Quarry

It is spectacular and the view from the road to the Lookdown across to a vast hillside which has been turned into a quarry is a reminder of how the mining industry can defile some of the countryside's natural wonders. The Colong Foundation's notes the history of this scar on the landscape as follows: "1921 - Limestone quarrying commences north of the Bungonia Gorge at Marulan South on a small scale.

1970-71 - Minister for Mines authorises the substantial revocation of reserves 2263 and 2755 on the northern side of Bungonia Creek to allow for a southward expansion of Australian Portland Cement Manufacturers Ltd's (APCM) quarries on two new leases. Mining has continued and proliferated since this time, encroaching into the gorge to the very edge of Bungonia Canyon."



History

- * An ex-convict, John Wilson, was the first European to pass through the Bungonia district when he led an expedition into the area in 1798. The plan, devised by Governor Hunter, was to explore the area and provide a very negative report. At the time convicts were escaping and heading south in the mistaken belief that China was only 150 miles away.
- * In 1818 Hamilton Hume, Charles Throsby and James Meehan passed through. They were assessing the agricultural potential of the plains around Goulburn.
- * In 1818 the South or Argyle Road, little more than a track, was passing close to the settlement on a route from Camden via Bong Bong, Moss Vale, Sutton Forest and Brisbane Meadow to Lake Bathurst and Braidwood.
- * In 1819 Governor Lachlan Macquarie ordered the construction of a Great South Road from Picton to the Goulburn Plains. The road, which passed through Marulan and had a major diversion to Bungonia, was opened progressively between 1830 and 1843.
- * In 1824 the botanist and explorer, Alan Cunningham, recorded the discovery of a cave in what is now the Bungonia State Recreation Area.
- * By 1832 a town was starting to form. It was initially called Inverary which was the name of the Post Office. The area was mostly settled by convicts and ticket of leave men who worked on the large properties in the area.
- * In 1836 Inverary was renamed Bungonia. By this time the Great South Road was traversing country from Marulan to Goulburn. The result was that Bungonia stopped growing.
- * A stonemason named Patrick Kelly was responsible for the construction of a number of significant buildings in the 1839s and 1840s St Michael's Catholic Church (1847), Hotel Victoria (1837), Old Parsonage (1841).
- * In 1851 gold was discovered in the Shoalhaven River near Bungonia but it was never enough to prompt a rush to the area.
- * In 1866 the Roman Catholic School was opened with 39 students. It was made from sawn timber and shingles.
- * In 1872 Bungonia National Park, known at the time as a water reserve, became one of the oldest protected parks in Australia.
- * In 1880 the Catholic school became the local Public School and a schoolhouse and residence were built in 1882.
- * In 1889 Louis Guymer became the first caretaker at Bungonia National Park. He remained as caretaker for the next 20 years.
- * The Police Station was built in 1907.

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
2006 KOKODA **2006**

OLDER AUSTRALIANS ENCOURAGED TO ROLL BACK THE CLOCK

Lane Cove Bowling and Recreation Club is taking a step towards curbing low physical activity rates among older Australians by encouraging them to "roll back the clock" through lawn bowls.

Roll Back the Clock is a Bowls Australia initiative, in partnership with Sport Australia, that aims to boost physical activity rates among Australians aged 65 and over through bowls, light exercise and education.

Presently, as little as 25-percent of Australians over-65 meet the Department of Health's physical activity guidelines of 30 minutes of activity per day.

Health-related reasons, including physical and mental health, are the main barriers for older Australians participating in sport or physical activities and bowls is seen as a low-impact, socially-inclusive activity that can be enjoyed by individuals of all ages.

Roll Back The Clock programs incorporate a two-part activity lasting 30 minutes each, targeting both the body and mind through bowls, functional training, fitness and wellness education, and socialisation.

Sessions are adapted for individuals, with benefits ranging from enabling participants to perform activities of daily life more easily, to withstanding injuries and providing a sense of accomplishment and achievement.

In addition to the physical health benefits, engaging in physical activity and group sports for older Australians provides increasingly important opportunities for socialisation, peer-support, and conversation that reduces the possibility for loneliness related physical and mental illnesses.


